Why is it important for a small builder to ensure construction work is carried out in a way that avoids harm?

Small builders are those at most risk of injury and ill health on construction sites and suffer the majority of construction fatal accidents each year in the UK. Most deaths involve falls from height including: ladders, scaffolds, working platforms, roof edges, and falls through fragile roofs or rooflights. Because they have first-hand experience in doing the actual work, they are in a good position to ensure the work is carried out in a way which secures their own health and safety and that of others

HSE's advice is that for most office electrical equipment, visual checks for obvious signs of damage and perhaps simple tests by a competent member of staff are quite sufficient.
